### **Background:**

It is estimated that 8-12% of patients admitted to hospital in the EU suffer from adverse events whilst receiving healthcare, such as healthcare-associated infections (approximately 25% of adverse events), medication-related errors, surgical errors, medical device failures, errors in diagnosis and failure to act on the results of tests. An estimated 4.1 million patients per year in the EU acquire a healthcare associated infection, and at least 37 000 die as a result. In June 2009, the Council adopted a *Recommendation on patient safety, including the prevention and control of healthcare-associated infections* (2009/C 151/01) which calls on Member States to put in place a series of measures with a view to minimising harm to patients receiving healthcare, adopt and implement a strategy at the appropriate level for the prevention and control of HAIs, and consider setting up an inter-sectoral mechanism or equivalent system for the coordinated implementation of such a strategy.

Since 2009, much work has been done in terms of a general raised awareness about patient safety at political level in Europe, but still the 53% of all EU citizens think it is likely that patients could be harmed by hospital and not hospital care in their country.

Health First Europe has been working on issues of patient safety, including aspects of anti-microbial resistance (AMR), since its inception in 2004. To map and measure patient safety policies implementation in Europe, HFE created 11 indicators and 7 European Member States went through HFE scrutiny in the last 6 months.
